Is long-term care the right choice for me or my loved one?

When it becomes necessary to consider alternative living arrangements, they help you and your family understand your options, including: Assisted living; Supportive housing; Retirement homes

If you feel staying at home is no longer possible and the above options do not provide the appropriate supports, it may be time to consider a long-term care home for ongoing health care in a residential setting. Long-term care homes are residential homes that provide ongoing care to patients whose care needs cannot be met in the community. People may require this level of support due to advancing age, disability or declining health.

Imagine that you live alone and need help.
Imagine the relief for a 24-7 Caregiver to have a place close to home to visit their family member

We may not like these facilities however

Imagine where people would be without them.

Delayed admission to a long-term care home can result in health complications for people waiting, as well as create stress for them, family members and other caregivers. If people are waiting in hospital when they could be in a long-term care home, it may affect the hospital's ability to provide services to other patients who require hospital care.

The Ontario government has invested \$6.4 billion to build 30,000 net new long-term care spaces by 2028. This includes a \$3.7 billion investment beginning in 2024–25, on top of the historic \$2.68 billion already invested since Spring 2019. The funding will be used to add new capacity and upgrade older spaces to modern design standards. It supports the government's goal of ending hallway health care, addressing growing waitlists, and ensuring that every resident experiences the best possible quality of life, supported by safe, high-quality care. Funds have been allocated for a new facility in Thornbury at the Campus of Care.

Ontario Supporting Young Entrepreneurs

Summer Company program helping next generation launch new businesses

WHITBY — The Ontario government is providing an additional investment of \$1.5 million to bolster its Summer Company program, helping an additional 250 young people start and grow a business. The investment will increase total funding for the program to more than \$4.7 million over the next two years.

"Ontario continues to help the next generation of youth-led businesses through the Summer Company entrepreneurship program," said Nina Tangri, Associate Minister of Small Business. "This exciting program expands the pipeline of entrepreneurs by providing more students with the training and supports they need to launch and run their own summer business. It's good for our young people and fantastic for Ontario's future economy."

The Summer Company program provides students between the ages of 15 and 29 with at least 12 hours of business training, one-on-one mentoring and grants up to \$3,000 to start a full-time business. Over the past five years, the program, delivered through Small Business Enterprise Centres, has helped launch over 1,700 businesses across Ontario.

"Small businesses and entrepreneurs, including youth entrepreneurs, are a critical part of Ontario's plan to grow the economy," said Peter Bethlenfalvy, Minister of Finance. "Our government is proud to support our province's young people through the Summer Company program as they start and grow their careers."

Small businesses play a critical role in our communities and are an essential part of Ontario's economy, employing over two million people. Ontario offers a range of programs and supports to assist entrepreneurs towards starting and growing new companies, including Regional Innovation Centres, Intellectual Property Ontario, Starter Company Plus and tailored options, advice and business analysis through business advisory services.

CSWBP Homelessness Response Steering Committee Housing Individuals and Families in Grey & Bruce

The Community Safety and Well-Being Planning Homelessness Response Steering Committee has been working diligently to ensure community members are safely housed. The committee is a partnership with Bruce County, Grey County, and community service providers to further develop approaches to addressing homelessness through a rural perspective. In January and February 2024, 33 households have been housed from the By-Names List across Bruce County and Grey County. Having local data to measure the impact of coordinated services continues to drive changes in service delivery approaches and provides partners with the information needed to continue planning for our communities.

What is the By-Name List (BNL)?

A By-Name List is a real-time list of all known people experiencing homelessness in your community. It includes a robust set of data points that support coordinated access and prioritization at a household level as well as an understanding of homeless inflow and outflow at a system level.

As of February 2024, the combined Bruce-Grey BNL identified 170 households experiencing active homelessness. Of those, 126 individuals are experiencing chronic homelessness, meaning they have been without stable housing for more than 6 months.

Homelessness Response

The primary goal of homelessness response is to lower the number of households experiencing chronic homelessness by increasing access to tenancies and decreasing the number of households entering the system. To help reach this goal, both Grey and Bruce Counties offer 10% of vacant housing units to individuals or families on the active By-Name List.

In addition, both Grey County and Bruce County offer Emergency Shelter and/or Short-Term Housing programs. These programs support as many households as possible with time limited shelter when experiencing homelessness. Community members can call 211 for the most up to date information about these programs, including information on how to access support.

The Homelessness Response team in Bruce and Grey is working hard to prioritize services and provide the highest level of supports to the residents of the community.


What is the Community Safety and Well-Being Plan (CSWBP) Grey-Bruce?

Community Safety and Well-Being Planning helps organizations improve the things that keep us healthy, happy, and safe. Together, we use research to create solutions focused on education, health care, food, housing, income, crime, and belonging. It is important that we create a welcoming community where problems are solved before they happen and where different professionals and community members come together to help people now and in the future.

The ongoing work of CSWBP is supported by an advisory committee representing over 74 partners from across Bruce and Grey who are working together to address crime prevention by investing in social development, prevention, and risk interventions. This upstream preventative model focuses on creating protective factors that make individuals less vulnerable to crime and victimization.













Applications Now Open for Ontario Learn and Stay Grant

Students enrolled in eligible health human resource programs could receive free tuition, books and other supplies

TORONTO — The Ontario government has opened grant applications for the Ontario Learn and Stay Grant for the 2024-25 academic year. Postsecondary students who want to pursue a career in nursing, paramedicine or medical lab technology can now apply for the grant. Nearly 3,800 learners have already received funding through the grant to help pay for their postsecondary education.

The grant is designed to encourage students to learn and stay locally, helping to bring in-demand health care workers to underserved communities across the province.

"As the first year of the Ontario Learn and Stay Grant wraps up with great success, we're excited to open applications for the 2024-25 academic year," said Jill Dunlop, Minister of Colleges and Universities. "By making it easier for future health care workers to access world-class training through this grant, we're helping to build a stronger, more resilient health care workforce in the communities that need it most."

The grant provides full, upfront funding for tuition, books and other costs for students who enrol in the first or second year of an eligible nursing, paramedic or medical laboratory technologist program and agree to stay in underserved communities to work after graduation.

"Our government is taking bold action to continue to grow Ontario's health care workforce for today and years to come," said Sylvia Jones, Deputy Premier and Minister of Health. "The Learn and Stay Grant is adding more health care workers in communities across the province to ensure no matter where you live, you can connect to the care you need, where and when you need it."

Grant applications are now open for postsecondary students who enrol in their first or second year in the following programs and regions:

- Nursing programs in northern, eastern and southwestern Ontario
- Medical laboratory technologist/medical laboratory sciences programs in northern and southwestern Ontario
- Paramedic programs in northern Ontario.

Quick Facts

Since the launch of the grant in 2022, there has been a nearly 40 per cent uptake in paramedic programs compared to the previous year's enrolment in those programs.

Students can apply for the grant up to 60 days before the end of their study period, meaning they can apply well after they've started their eligible 2024-25 program.

To be eligible for the grant, students must:

- be a Canadian citizen, permanent resident or protected person and live in Ontario
- enrol in the first or second year of an eligible diploma, advanced diploma, undergraduate, masters or post-graduate program in a priority region
- commit to work in the region where they studied for a minimum of six months for every year of study funded by the grant.

Students can also apply for the Ontario Student Assistance Program (OSAP) to help pay for other costs, such as living expenses.

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Notice of Public Meeting Application for Zoning Bylaw Amendment

Property Location: Town-wide

What is being proposed?

The proposal is seeking an amendment to Zoning By-law 2018-65 to update the Development 'D' Zone provisions. Currently, the zoning provisions of the former Town of Thornbury Zoning By-law 10-77 and Township of Collingwood Zoning By-law 83-40 continue to apply to lands zoned D within the Town. This has resulted in confusion regarding the permitted uses and standards associated with these lands.

In order to provide greater clarity for owners of D-zoned land, the Town is proposing to remove Section 1.5(g) of the Zoning By-law, which requires reference to the former Town of Thornbury and Township of Collingwood Zoning By-laws. In lieu of this provision, a list of permitted uses and standards will be developed for all D-zoned lands and incorporated into Zoning By-law 2018-65.

A draft of proposed provisions is included with this notice. Please note that these are subject to change following public consultation and a decision of Council. It is also noted that existing uses would be permitted to continue in accordance with Section 4.24 of the Zoning By-law

The effects of the draft provisions on D-zoned properties would include:

- 1. Additional residential units are added as a permitted use;
- 2. Existing uses are permitted to continue;
- 3. Any modifications to main buildings must continue to meet the setbacks and height standards as established at the time of the By-law being passed;
- 4. Construction of new single detached dwellings on vacant properties are prohibited;
- 5. New accessory buildings and structures and additional residential units can be constructed in accordance with the relevant zoning provisions applicable to those uses.

To determine if your property is zoned Development 'D', please use the Town's Interactive Zoning Map, which can be found on the Zoning Information page of the Town website.

The Town of The Blue Mountains is seeking to develop a Water and Wastewater Allocation Policy. This policy aims to provide a clear and cohesive set of guidelines that will govern the equitable allocation of water and wastewater resources to meet the evolving needs of the growing community in the most beneficial manner possible.

Currently, allocation is granted on a "first come, first serve" basis and the Town does not have a mechanism in place to grant allocation with a lens to community priorities. To do so, the Town is developing a policy that is inclusive of scoring criteria and an evaluation framework that can be applied when a development is positioned to execute an agreement to commence construction.

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Notice of Study Commencement and Public Information Centre Wastewater Master Plan



The Town of The Blue Mountains has initiated a Municipal Class Environmental Assessment (MCEA) to complete a Wastewater Master Plan. This study is being conducted according to the requirements of Phases 1 and 2 of the MCEA process which is an approved process under the Environmental Assessment Act. This Master Plan is being completed as an Approach 2 Master Plan with sufficient detail to fulfill the requirements for Schedule 'B' projects (e.g., new or upgraded sewage pumping stations, forcemains, etc.).

How will this affect me?

The purpose of the study is to evaluate the Town's long-term wastewater treatment and collection system needs and identify a preferred solution to be implemented to improve the system to accommodate the Town's growth. This process will help to identify system requirements and assist with long-term capital planning. Public and agency consultation is a key element of the process and input will be sought throughout the study to inform the evaluation and selection of the preferred wastewater servicing strategy.

Grey County Council Chooses Contractor For Historic Rockwood Terrace Construction

The tender has closed for the largest capital construction project in Grey County history. Grey County Council is recommending awarding the Rockwood Terrace general construction contract to Melloul-Blamey Construction Ltd. with a bid of \$59,230,000 (excluding HST). Council made the decision at the April 25 session of Committee of the Whole. The project will be co-funded by the provincial government and requires approval from the Ministry of Long-Term Care before the tender can be formally awarded.

"Nearly a decade of discussions, planning, consultations, and revisions have led us to today's historic vote by Council that will solidify high-quality public long-term care services in southern Grey County for decades," said Grey County Warden Brian Milne. "This is a huge milestone in the project but there's still an incredible amount of work ahead of us. We look forward to working with Melloul-Blamey Construction Ltd. in building this state-of-the-art home."

The general contractor is responsible for the construction of the new 128-bed, Class A long-term care home in Durham. The current Rockwood Terrace facility has only 100 beds and was built in the 1980s. Its operating license is expiring, and this provides the County with an opportunity to upgrade it to meet changing standards set by the Ministry of Long-Term Care.

Redeveloping a long-term care home is a heavily detailed and regulated process. Resident experience has been central to the planning and design of the new home. Grey County engaged with residents, family members, and frontline workers to design the building to meet the needs of everyone in the home. Emphasis was placed on resident room design, infection prevention and control, dining room experience and an overall community feeling throughout the home. Kasian Architecture Inc. and Ted Handy and Associates have led the design phase.

Work at the site has been ongoing since the fall of 2023.



JT Excavating Ltd. was awarded the sitework contract last fall and has built roads, cleared and graded the site and prepared it for servicing. A second phase of sitework will take place after construction is substantially completed and will include work like final paving and sidewalks.

The total budget for the Rockwood Terrace reconstruction project is \$96.7 million. Redevelopment costs will be funded by both Grey County and the provincial government. The province will provide \$62.9 million toward the project, \$48.5 million of this amount through annual transfer payments over the next 25 years. Grey County will finance the balance of the costs through a loan from Infrastructure Ontario. Contributions to a redevelopment reserve are being made in anticipation of the loan expense.

Grey County hopes to receive approval from the province to award the contract very soon. Work on the site is anticipated to begin in mid-June.
