PROVINCE TERMINATES \$2.3 MILLION FUNDING AGREEMENT

The Town completed a Municipal Class Environmental Assessment in July 2017 for the management of leachate generated at the Town's Solid Waste Disposal Site. The preferred solution is to pipe the leachate to the Thornbury Wastewater Treatment Plant. Leachate is liquid collected within the landfill cell. Until the pipe is constructed, the leachate is trucked to a receiving station in Craigleith. The Town was successful in receiving a \$2.3 million grant under the Municipal Greenhouse Gas Challenge Fund, a program aimed at reducing climate change related emissions. The Town received correspondence from the province July 10, 2018 that the program has been cancelled and that the grant monies are now withdrawn however, some wind-down funding may be available. The Town project is only part way through the design phase. Construction was planned to commence in early 2019. Town Council will consider a Staff Report regarding next steps at a Special Meeting of Council July 31, 2018.

ROB POTTER SWORN IN

At the June 29, Special Meeting of Council, Mr. Rob Potter was officially sworn in to office for the balance of the 2014 to 2018 Term of Council. Councillor Potter will receive Council training the week of July 3rd and on July 9, 2018 will attend his first Council Meeting as a member of Council.

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WRONG SIDE OF THE BERM by Robert Burcher

We've all seen it and cursed it! That ugly berm being built on the Lora Bay property. There are all sorts of rumours about it, but because it is on private property there isn't anything that can be done about it. However, the Ministry of Transportation is investigating it for not being totally compliant.

But it has become symbolic of the major psychological divide in this community. Which side of the Berm are you on? The nice protected community of a somewhat gated community or those of us who live outside and have to endure the ugly process of change.

Now we see that there is in fact a gathering storm of inequality between those who have moved into this incredible town with their wealth and influence and those of us who have been here a long time and are still trying to get by despite the rising costs of living in paradise.

It is months away to the municipal election in October but already the rhetoric is getting hot. Vocal that fought the good fight in the "War of the Library" and took on the Town for its lack of transparency. The Citizen's Forum was formed and holds weekly public meetings every Tuesday at Maiolo's Restaurant. This has become one of the most remarkable positive changes that the struggle in our community has fostered. It is called Democracy!

Candidates have been invited to speak individually for fifteen minutes and then face the crowd to a barrage of questions for forty-five minutes. There is only ever one candidate on stage so there is no hostility, no grandstanding, and no arguing with the other candidates. In fact it is up to the audience to make their own decisions on the words, the character and the ambitions of who they are going to vote for. It will take time though to work through sixteen candidates. That's at least sixteen hours of being involved closely in our political process as you listen and ponder and maybe ask a question.

Each week the crowd grows and gets more involved in the process. The question of the "Berm" has become a constant irritant. Every candidate has had to address that question.







RUMOUR HAS IT THAT COUNCIL HAS MOVED ON FROM THE MICHAEL SEGUIN AFFAIR — THIS IS A MYTH!

Media Release from Michael Seguin Dear Supporters, Constituents, and Fellow Residents

I have been told by members of the community that some on Council may be spreading a rumour that my legal affair with the Town has been resolved. Nothing could be further from the truth. We are headed to Court on August 2nd. The majority of Council, led by Mayor McKean and Deputy Mayor Ardiel, have rejected my acceptance of their March 28th, 2018 offer to settle and want to continue to pursue action against me at the taxpayer's expense.

As I have stated in public, all I have ever asked for was procedural fairness and justice, with regard to the improperly carried out investigation of the alleged complaints filed by the former CAO, in May, 2016, which was followed by sanctions which were clearly designed to smear my good name and reputation. I've tried on many occasions to settle this matter in good faith and offered to settle

at substantially less than my legal costs, as well as offering to resign from Council.

Councillor Michael Martin hoping to resolve this matter in-house presented a motion to have the matter dealt with by a mediator but that was also turned down.

Council's latest legal maneuver, which is designed to drag this matter out and to continue to drive up my legal bills. They are expressing no remorse about spending your money and continuing their campaign against me. This has caused considerable emotional stress and financial strain on my wife (Catherine) and I over the past two years.

As I no longer have any funds to keep paying my lawyer, I am forced to defend myself against the Town's motion to continue the court proceedings. I have no choice but to ask the judge to dismiss the case.

I hope that the outrage and unprecedented level of citizen activism that has been unleashed in the community, as a result of my ordeal, will continue through the 2018 election, and that we will all work together as a community to elect a new Council.



You must, you must, you must visit the Sheffield's Black History Museum in Clarksburg. A hidden gem of a museum hiding in our town that deserves all the recognition that it can possibly get. Originally on a Collingwood site it relocated to the old summer camp on the Clarksburg Sideroad just up from the OPP station nine years ago. But be warned this is a tough visit to our past. This museum is about the worst part of our North American history – Slavery! Yes you will see actual neck restraints, a ball and chain and a cat o' nine tails. All of them mute reminders from the days of the slave horror. A huge six foot wide poster shows the interior layout of a slave ship that just can't be believed for the atrocity of the crowding and that the slaves were chained to the floor for months in their crossing from Africa.

The displays evolve into images of the cotton and sugar plantations in the Deep South of USA and the mind numbing body destroying work. But as you work your way through the displays you start to respect the huge courage needed for the slaves who escaped the tyranny and worked their way north on the Underground Railway.

Walking by night and following the North Star they worked their way to Canada. Then some of them like Harriet Tubman went back to the USA nineteen times to lead more people on the path to freedom. A true admiration of the human spirit to live and to be free.

In the early 1800's a constant stream of escaped slaves worked their way as far north as Grey and Bruce Counties. Our forested wilderness of the time became a safe haven, far away from the Bounty Hunters who would search areas near the border for runaways. At the museum in Clarksburg on the Heritage Walk in the woods you will see the tiny cabins recreated of how these folks lived at the time in their clearings deep in the forest.

Eventually when white settlers with legal title to the land arrived the blacks who were squatters were pushed off the land and into Collingwood and Owen Sound to find work. They became the working underclass of shipbuilders, cooks, seamstresses and railway porters. The museum goes into detail of that evolving history with artifacts from the Collingwood Shipyards and the working tools


from barber shops, dress making facilities and laundries. Eventually with steady work and a dedication to education the black community became a valuable element in our area. The kids became sports heroes, soldiers in the World Wars and major contributors to church and community.

One of the most stunning artifacts in the museum is a needlework quilt showing the multiple routes that slaves would take on their perilous journeys from the Deep South to Ontario. This quilt was a four year project by Shirley Hartley.

It is worth the \$5.00 admission charge just to see and study this quilt.

But at the end of the trip through this history saga you are left with a great peace that prevails on this leafy green and relaxing site. It is as if all those who died enroute have found their home in "Glory Land" and it exists on 241 Clark St Clarksburg.



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HISTORY / EVOLUTION OF THE FAIR

The Beaver Valley Agricultural Society is the oldest organization in our community. It formed in 1870, as the Collingwood Township Agricultural Society, with those original members breaking off from the Euphrasia Township Agricultural Society which had formed almost a decade earlier.

The agricultural societies in Ontario formed with an eye to improving farm stock and crops, with this particular area's climate being well suited to the production of pasture to feed the various cattle, horses, sheep and swine of those pioneering farmers, plus having excellent grain-producing qualities.

"I have long been of the opinion that much benefit would result to farmers by often meeting at this season of the year and comparing their experiences," wrote William J. Marsh, the society's first president, in his annual address in 1878.

From 1850, when Thornbury was little more than a sawmill, to 1870, when the agricultural society formed, Collingwood Township grew to have 3,576 people on 557 farms with 17,055 acres under crop, according to the census records. This fast became a thriving agricultural community.

The Agricultural Society renamed itself in 1967, becoming the

Clarksburg Agricultural Society, in honour of Canada's centennial year and because the fall fair was held in Clarksburg. When the fall fair moved in 1972 to the Beaver Valley Community Centre in Thornbury, another name change was in order and it became the Beaver Valley Agricultural Society.

The purpose of the annual fall fair hasn't changed much over the last century and a half. People still show their various homecrafts, baking and preserves, bring their fruits and vegetables, flowers, and hay and grain crops. Animals are still a mainstay, though the huge numbers of cattle, horses, chickens, sheep and pigs that crowded the fairgrounds before the First World War has obviously seen changes.

The fall fair is more than just farmers comparing their annual notes on livestock and crop success and failure. In the days before the telephone, never mind the Internet, people had to meet to communicate. Now we choose to meet to celebrate the annual harvest, to educate tourists and residents alike on our farming history and culture, to promote the local agricultural industry and lifestyle, and to celebrate our community's life and pride by providing the longest-running community event in The Blue Mountains.
