Ontario Expanding Access to Lifechanging Treatment for Cystic Fibrosis

Individuals aged six and over can now apply for publicly-funded Trikafta treatment

The Ontario government has expanded coverage for Trikafta, the latest treatment option for cystic fibrosis, to include all Ontarians aged six and over through its publicly-funded drug program. The province is also changing the eligibility criteria to remove the measurement of patients' lung function in order to further reduce barriers for cystic fibrosis patients to access lifechanging treatments.

"Expanding coverage will ensure that more children with cystic fibrosis will be able to benefit from this innovative, lifechanging treatment sooner," said Sylvia Jones, Deputy Premier and Minister of Health. "Providing patients with more options for treatment is another step in our government's work to build a stronger health care system for all Ontarians."

Previously, treatment was only available to Ontarians aged 12 and over. Following new recommendations by the Canadian Agency for Drugs and Technology in Health (CADTH), Ontario is now the first province to expand access to youth aged six to 11. Eligible patients and their families should reach out to their health care team to help determine

if Trikafta is the right treatment option for them.

"Today's news will change the trajectory of the disease and the future for many children and adults in Ontario who live with cystic fibrosis," said Kelly Grover, President and CEO, Cystic Fibrosis Canada. "Ontario was one of the first provinces to fund the drug for those 12 years of age and older last year, and today has continued to recognize Trikafta's extraordinary, transformative value, by expanding coverage of Trikafta to include children ages six to 11 years old. We are pleased to see that the restrictive start criterion has also been removed, enabling more people to access the drug. We celebrate this news alongside our CF community in Ontario, who have worked tirelessly for this day."

Quick Facts

- Cystic fibrosis is a rare and progressive genetic disease that causes thick mucus to build up in the lungs, digestive tract and other parts of the body. It causes persistent lung infections and leads to loss of lung function.
- It is estimated that one in every 3,600 children born in Canada has cystic fibrosis. There is currently no cure for cystic fibrosis.
- An estimated 1,500 Ontarians have cystic fibrosis.
- At list price, Trikafta costs approximately \$300,000 per patient per year.

Proposed Revisions to Council and Committee of Adjustment Procedural By-laws as it relates to Meeting Cycles

Grey County Among Top Long-Term Care Culture Change Trailblazers In Canada

Grey County's long-term care department is a national trailblazer. The County was one of 17 care providers from across all of Canada to be nominated for the 2022 Trailblazers Awards through the Research Institute for Aging. These awards recognize homes that have made strides in changing the culture of aging through initiatives, programs, and day-to-day practices. Grey County was recognized for the "Colour It Your Way" promise of a resident-led model of care.

"Being recognized for a Trailblazer Award is a great accomplishment for our team and well-earned validation for a decade-long mission to make our long-term care residents the centre of everything we do," said Scott Mackey, Chair of Grey County's Long-Term Care Committee of Management. "I extend my sincere thanks and appreciation to Director Jennifer Cornell and all of the staff at Grey Gables, Rockwood Terrace and Lee Manor for their ongoing compassion and dedication to those in our care."

News of the award nomination was shared with the Grey County Long-Term Care Committee of Management at the July 12 meeting.

Grey County embarked on the Colour It Your Way culture change initiative in 2013. The vision of Colour It is to enrich the quality of life for residents by moving away from a medical and institutional model of care to a relationship-focused and resident-led model. This shift required the buy in and support of all long-term care stakeholders, including leadership, staff, and volunteers. Colour It continues to guide resident interactions and broader decisions in the County's three homes.

The Trailblazer Awards are presented by the Research Institute for Aging annually at the national Walk With Me conference. This conference is aimed at changing the culture of aging in Canada. Older adults, care partners, educators, policy makers, students, and researchers from across Canada come together to learn with and from each other about how to enhance the journey of ageing across the continuum of care and community living.

Grey County operates 316 long-term care beds across three long-term care homes in the communities of Markdale, Owen Sound and Durham.

First confirmed case of monkeypox in Grey-Bruce

The Grey Bruce Health Unit is reporting the first laboratory-confirmed case of monkeypox in the area.

The person diagnosed with the illness resides in Grey-Bruce, but most likely acquired the infection while visiting the Greater Toronto Area. The individual is currently self-isolating at home.

Health unit staff has determined that the individual had only one close contact in the area and is following up with that person.

"Public Health would like to stress that although a case of monkeypox has been confirmed in Grey-Bruce, the risk to the community remains very low," says Grey-Bruce Medical Officer of Health Dr. Ian Arra.

"Only individuals who have had close, direct contact with a person with monkeypox are at risk of acquiring the infection. This is not a virus that spreads easily. Anyone experiencing symptoms is advised to self-isolate at home and contact their healthcare provider immediately."

Human monkeypox is a viral zoonotic disease, which, historically, has rarely been reported outside of Africa. However, the virus has been confirmed in more than two dozen countries, including Canada, during the current, multi-country monkeypox outbreak.

The virus was first reported in Canada on May 19, 2022. As of July 6, Canadian provinces and territories have publicly reported a combined 358 cases, according to the Public Health Agency of Canada. Just over 100 of those cases have been reported in Ontario.

Monkeypox infections are typically mild, with most people recovering on their own in two to four weeks. However, the virus can cause severe illness and death in some individuals.

Symptoms of monkeypox, which usually develop five to 21 days after exposure, occur in two stages. Stage 1 symptoms can include fever, chills, headache, muscle pain, swollen lymph nodes and lethargy. A rash or lesions develop in the second stage, usually within one to three days after the fever starts. The rash typically begins on the face before spreading to other parts of the body.

Monkeypox can spread from person to person through close contact with an infected individual's bodily fluids or skin lesions. It can also be transmitted when a person comes into contact with contaminated clothing or bedding.

A person is considered infectious from the start of their symptoms and until the rash/lesions have crusted over and the scabs have dried up and fallen off.

All symptomatic individuals are advised to self-isolate at home. Anyone diagnosed with monkeypox must isolate until all scabs have fallen off and have healed.

The Grey Bruce Health Unit continues to closely monitor the monkeypox situation.

Fraser Institute News Release:

Shrinking ratio of Canadian workers to seniors will strain government finances in coming years; only 3 working age individuals for every senior by 2027.

As Canada's population ages, the number of working-aged Canadians relative to the number of seniors has declined from 5.4 in 2000 to 3.4 in 2022, which means government spending related to demographics is increasing at the same time that the growth in tax revenues is declining, finds a new study by the Fraser Institute, an independent, non-partisan Canadian public policy think-tank.

"Workers pay the bulk of taxes, which governments need to fund important services, including health care and income transfers to seniors. As the relative number of seniors grows, and the relative number of workers declines, government finances across Canada will be put under increasing strain," said Ben Eisen, senior fellow at the Fraser Institute and co-author of *Understanding the Changing Ratio of Working-Age Canadians to Seniors and Its Consequences*.

The study finds that the share of Canada's population that is 65 or older increased from 14.1 per cent in 2010 to 19.0 per cent in 2022. Statistics Canada projects this number will increase to 25.0 per cent by 2059.

At the same time, the share of the population that is working-age (aged 15 to 64) is declining, such that the ratio of workers to seniors is also shrinking. For example, in 1970, the ratio of workers to seniors was 7.8, meaning there were almost 8 workers for every senior. This year, that ratio has dropped to just 3.4 workers to every one senior. By 2050, the ratio is expected to decline further to just 2.5 workers for every senior in Canada.

Crucially, as the number of seniors rise, there will be more people collecting income transfers such as the Old Age Security and the Guaranteed Income Supplement. Likewise, average annual per person health-care costs for people aged 65-74 is \$7,751, compared to just \$2,811 for people aged 35-44. This means that government expenses will increase substantially as the number of seniors rises.

And conversely, there will be fewer workers relative to the number of seniors, while workers pay the bulk of government taxes.

This shrinking ratio of workers to seniors in Canada—which is already underway—is a significant headwind to policymakers in their efforts to improve the sustainability of government finances in Canada," Eisen said.

The next Ontario municipal and school board elections are October 24, 2022. If you are a resident, owner or tenant of property in Ontario, a Canadian citizen and 18 years of age or older election day, you can vote.

1. confirm or update their electoral information;
2. add an elector name to an address; and,
3. change school support for the purpose of voting in a school board election.






